### **ADMINISTRATION –**

## **BOARD-**

Glads: Great teachers and staff

School choice-generates revenue, the school district has good reputation in the area Options that are available to students

Sads: Lack of community support/involvement and not noticing what the district is doing

Lack of funding for student initiatives

Increased needs of students not identified and inability to meet needs

Mads: Lack of support for building a new school

Community communication – misrepresentation of facts

Pressure put on students too early – not allowing them to be kids

## **COMMUNITY SERVICES/RELIGIOUS-**

Our future generation has a ton of potential

Sads: Handling of the school referendum – inadequate facilities

Lack of collaboration due to weak partnerships and breakdown of communication

Lack of resources for families and knowing how to leverage those resources

Mads: Decrease in morals and values due to parenting/family dynamics

Too much national/federal influences over education – separation of church & state

Failure to acknowledge problems within the district and breakdowns

### **HIGHER EDUCATION-**

Glads: School pride – athletics and music

Partnerships – teacher collaboration, college credit in high school

Amazing counseling staff

Sads: Need even stronger connections between school faculty/staff and local higher education

That we are not striking a better balance in valuing all post-secondary options

Stories from current and former students who felt bullied and disrespected for those

differences
