Peshtigo Parent Spotlight: We're Listening!

n Peshtigo one of our most valuable assets is our parental support! Recently, we had the opportunity to speak with Lisa Maxwell, who along with her husband Thomas, are parents to three children spanning our district. Aleiah is a third grader at our Peshtigo Elementary Learning Center. Elizabeth is a 7th grader and Lorelei is starting high school as a freshman this year at the Peshtigo Middle/High School.

We wanted to know how parents felt when the governor closed our schools and sent kids home and how it impacted the family. Lisa said "There were times I felt illequipped as a parent. Our kids are used to excelling and mastering concepts, but with distance learning this resulted in intense anxiety and massive frustration". Confusion with math classes meant, as a parent, she had to learn new concepts so she could help teach her children. In some situations, communication was limited and the teaching platforms were so varied from teacher to teacher, it was hard to know how to navigate. She shared, "At times we felt like the teaching and the support wasn't there for our older children with some classes".

In contrast, Mrs. Maxwell felt like many teachers, especially at the elementary level, didn't make the same assumption. They knew the younger kids would need lots of contact and lots of emotional support. "Both Mrs. Gard and Mrs. Nolde were wonderful in working with our daughter last spring! They went to great lengths to personalize learning for their students. They touched base with students frequently, and provided personalized feedback to students". The communication displayed by Mrs. Nolde and Mrs. Gard included emailing lessons with back-up support strategies which was very helpful for parents.

"Mrs. Fendrick also would go out of her way to monitor my daughter's work and send positive notes home. My daughter's sixth grade teacher, Mrs. Jornlin, was highly responsive. I remember one instance when Elizabeth was confused about an assignment, and within the span of an hour, Mrs. Jornlin set up a class Google meeting and clarified the issue for the whole class."

Mrs. Maxwell said, "It seemed like there was an assumption that older students are so much more tech savvy that they can be left alone. Even though many older students are more responsible and tech savvy, they still want to feel supported. They want to feel safe. It's easier for students to feel lost. As we move forward with this hybrid schedule for the older kids, I would love to see overcommuniction. Especially if we have to switch to 100% virtual learning for the older children, there is no such thing as too much communication!"

To Mrs. Maxwell and all of the other parents out there: we want you to know we've learned from our experiences last spring. We're making much more of an effort to communicate. All teachers at the older levels are all using the same platform, Google Classroom, to be more consistent for students and parents. We're better prepared to teach virtually if that is needed. Our "Forward Together" plan is to keep teaching all of our kids with in-person classes. At the Middle/ High School level, we are using the A/B schedule to socially distance. We have built in the Wednesday schedule for extra help for students and parents alike.

Parents fearful of what will happen if we go 100% virtual for the older kids should know that teachers will be teaching live from school using Google Meet four days a week, following kids' normal schedule. They will have full instructional classes Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday. We are all a team. This is new for everyone...but teachers are listening and learning too. We're going to keep moving forward, "Forward Together"!
