## **Progress and** growth: A day in a Peshtigo kindergarten classroom

PESHTIGO-Tammy Behnke has been teaching kindergarten for 23 years and she enjoys watching the children blossom.

She said kindergarten class is tough for 5-yearolds. "This is their first year attending school all day, for all five days, while eating lunch at school and attending specials," Behnke said. "We spend the first month building relationships, routines and expectations."

What's a typical day like in kindergarten?

Behnke greets students as they approach her in the hallway. "They tell me about swim lessons, a sister's birthday, or about los-ing a tooth," she said.

After welcoming her students, they start the daily calendar routine. Students review the alphabet, select numbers, sight words, a character trait and reminders for the day. Then comes announcements, the Bulldog Promise and the Pledge of Allegiance followed by breakfast

English Language Arts (ELA) is next. This consists of reading and discussion of a story, as well as a lesson on the letter and sound of the week. Word games come next to teach students language skills including word segmenting, rhyme and phonics. ularly challenging. Citizen" and "Jobs" magazines. Students have also been learning about Martin Luther King, Jr. from reading a magazine called "Let's Find Out.. The students have their science lesson in the afternoon and use a program called "Mystery Science" as part of their science curriculum. One recent unit was about force, called Force Olympics.

In addition to the core learning, another area of focus in kindergarten is teaching social skills and emotional awareness. Teachers use a program called Second Step, which is a social and emotional learning program consisting of 25 lessons. These activities teach skills like listening and cooperation as well as problem solving and brain building.

Four-year-old kindergarten plays a big role in the success of students in 5-year-old kindergarten.

"Our 4K(four year old kindergarten) teachers, Michelle Campbell and Justin Woulf, do such a good job in getting kids ready for kindergarten," she said. 'It's hard to imagine kindergarten before 4K."

Behnke explains that the social and emotional skills learned in 4K, as well as fine motor learning like holding pencils and using scissors, makes a big difference. Behnke said hat this year has been particstudents. Six of her students are totally new to school, while 12 of her students were in four-year kindergarten last year. This makes teaching more challenging, trying to adjust teaching to the different learning and experience ranges of students.

made. Her goal is to have the kids ready for first grade. As the year goes on, students have been developing friendships, and "act very caring and helpful towards one another. They have learned to spell some CVC (consonant vowel consonant) words and write simple sentences. Their fine motor skills and drawing skills have improved."

Benhke adds that math assessments have shown improvement in founda-

using nursery rhymes to help students learn sounds.

Students also play games to help them learn to read and spell. Games are also used to help learn math concepts. "Students learn many foundational math skills in kindergarten," Behnke said.

Students learn groups of five and 10, as well as teen numbers, besides adding and subtracting. They also learn partner numbers. and two and three dimensional shapes. Students use a variety of hand-held manipulatives to learn these concepts.

Behnke also holds "Math Talks," where she reviews daily math questions on the BenQ Board for students to answer. Students also learn math concepts through songs related to daily topics and computer based math programs, like Seesaw, Reading Eggs and Math Seeds.

After recess and lunch, the Kindergarteners get to experience "specials" and intervention. Depending on the day, students may go to physical education, music, or art class, referred to as specials.

Intervention consists of students getting more individual instruction to help them, depending on their ability levels.

"Some need extra practice learning letters/sounds while others need to be challenged on a higher level," Behnke said.

After intervention time, students work on social studies and science.
