Improved access to mental health care

Peshtigo School District contracts with outside firm

PESHTIGO — The Peshtigo School District is helping families access mental health care faster.

More than 50% of Americans will experience some degree of mental illness at some time in their lives, with 1 in 5 will experiencing mental illness in any given year, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC).

Now, Peshtigo School District families have improved access to mental health care services by contracting with a company called Care Solace (caresolace.org)

"The Peshtigo School District received a grant from the state to help offset the cost of mental health support for districts," said Julie Williams, the director of student services in Peshtigo. Care Solace works with more than 600 school districts. Over 15 million American students, family members and school staff have received help through Care Solace. Mental health issues can vary from the need for help with ADHD issues, substance abuse issues, or assistance with depression or trauma.

"Did you know that finding the best counselor or medical professional, people on average, send out over 60 emails, texts, or phone calls?" Williams said,



"This service will cut wait times for families. It can take 60-90 days to get your first appointment in many cases. Using the support from Care Solace cuts helps students and families navigate the initial process in 3 to 4 weeks."

"Parents are able to access someone at CareSolace during weekends, long breaks, and over the summer when **Guidance Counselors** are typically not accessible to get a care partner to help them secure a mental health professional," middle school guidance counselor Angie Matykowski adds. Care Solace is through a confidential portal. It's available anytime, day or night, every day of the

The company will help families coordinate with mental health providers and treatment options matched to their needs, regardless of their circumstances. "There are so many difficult things that families here and everywhere have gone through, over the last few years especially," said elementary guidance counselor Katie Seidler. "All of us could benefit from having support to work through these things and the way they affect our well-being so that we can be our best selves."
